ASSEMBLY: The supreme policy and decision-making organ. Composed of all Member State Heads of State and Government

EXECUTIVE COUNCIL: Coordinates and takes decisions on policies in areas of common interest to Member States. It is responsible to the Assembly. Composed of foreign ministers or such other ministers or authorities as are designated by the governments of Member States.

SPECIALISED TECHNICAL COMMITTEES: are thematic committees on key AU projects and programmes. STCs are responsible to the Executive Council. Composed of Member State ministers or senior officials.

PERMANENT REPRESENTATIVES COMMITTEE: is charged with preparing the work of the Executive Council. Composed of Permanent Representatives and other plenipotentiaries of Member States.

PEACE AND SECURITY COUNCIL: The AU's organ for the prevention, management and resolution of conflicts. Composed of 15 elected Member States.

AFRICAN UNION COMMISSION: The AU's secretariat. Composed of a Chairperson, Deputy Chairperson and eight commissioners as well as staff.

PAN-AFRICAN PARLIAMENT: Platform for people from all African states to participate in discussions and decision-making on issues facing the continent. Members are designated by the legislatures of their Member States.

ECONOMIC, SOCIAL & CULTURAL COUNCIL: Advisory organ that provides opportunity for African civil society organisations to contribute to the AU's principles, policies and programmes. Composed of social and professional groups from AU Member States.

JUDICIAL, HUMAN RIGHTS & LEGAL ORGANS: Organs are the: African Commission on Human and Peoples' Rights (ACHPR), African Court on Human and Peoples' Rights (AfCHPR), AU Commission on International Law (AUCIL), AU Advisory Board on Corruption (AUABC) and the African Committee of Experts on the Rights and Welfare of the Child (ACERWC).

FINANCIAL INSTITUTIONS: Proposed institutions are the: African Central Bank, African Investment Bank and the African Monetary Fund.

AFRICAN PEER REVIEW MECHANISM: Aims to foster the adoption of policies, values, standards and practices of political and economic governance that lead to political stability, accelerated economic integration, economic growth and sustainable development.

REGIONAL ECONOMIC COMMUNITIES: Regional groupings of African states that facilitate regional economic integration between members and through the wider African Economic Community (AEC).





THE AGENDA 2063

It is a strategic framework for the socioeconomic transformation of the continent over the next 50 years. Its builds on, and seeks to accelerate the implementation of past and existing continental initiatives for growth and sustainable development.

Some of the past and current initiatives it builds on include: the Lagos Plan of Action, the Abuja Treaty, the Minimum Integration Programme, the Programme for Infrastructural Development in Africa (PIDA), the Comprehensive Africa Agricultural Development Programme (CAADP), the New partnership for Africa's Development (NEPAD), Regional Plans and Programmes and National Plans. It is also built on national, regional, continental best practices in its formulation.

STAFF REGULATIONS AND RULES

The Staff Regulations and Rules define the conditions of service, rights, duties and obligations of the Staff Members of the African Union (Union). These Regulations and Rules shall be interpreted and applied alongside AU relevant Treaties, Decisions Protocols, Regulations, Rules and Procedures as well as principles of International Law.





CODE OF ETHICS AND CONDUCT

The Code of Ethics sets out the values and principles to guide the conduct and behaviour of African Union staff members and officials. Its purpose is to provide support and guidance for appropriate, ethical behaviour as well as to hold staff members and officials accountable for any lapses in behaviour.

POLICY ON HARASSMENT

The policy is issued in line with the Staff Regulations and Rules and the code of Ethics and Conduct in which no staff member shall be discriminated against and he or she shall be entitled to receive "assistance, protection and security, threats, abuse, harassment, insults or defamation to which they may be subject by reason, or in connection with, the performances of their duties" (Regulation 3.2). The purpose of the policy is to articulate the Union's policy harassment within the working environnement.



SECURITY POLICY

This security policy document sets out the African Union Safety and Security Services (AU SSS) intentions and principles concerning security and the protection of the Union personnel, property and operations. The policy provides the requirements for the AU Security Management Systeme (SMS) which includes establishing, implementing, operating, monitoring, maintaining, and improving security management.



PROCUREMENT MANUAL

The Manual details the standards, policies and procedures to be followed in the procurement of goods, works and services within the AU.

PROPERTY, PLANT AND EQUIPEMENT POLICY

This policy is designed to guide and align the management of, and accounting for, Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE) and Intangible Assets (IA) with International Public Sector Accounting Standards (IPSAS) requirements. Considering the significant amount of resources in these categories encompassed of assets. it is also imperative that the policy provides an environnement.





INFORMATION AND COMMUNICATION TECHNOLOGY POLICY

An AU ICT policy insures efficiency, accountability and cost-effectiveness in delivering and supporting IT services. This ICT Policy document provides a framework of credible policies which help MIS pursue of its objectives as well as creating appropriate awareness amongst all stakeholders.





MEDICAL BRIEF

High haltitude syndrome

When you come in Addis Ababa you should be prepared to recognize and respond to the symptoms of high altitude syndrome. The human body can adjust to changes in altitude (known as acclimatization) but needs time. The time needed by each individual varies and also varies with each trip. High altitude syndrome is suspected when the following occur on acute altitude gain:

- Headache (usually throbbing, on both sides, worse during the night and on awakening, made worse by bending over)
- Plus one of the following: nausea; fatigue; dizziness; sleep difficulty.

What to do?

- Drink a lot of water
- Get advice from doctors in our clinic



Other issues

- Malaria is common in areas of the country below 2,000 metres.
- Bilharzia is present in the majority of lakes in Ethiopia.
- Water-borne diseases are common.
 Drink or use only boiled or bottled water and avoid ice in drinks.
- Non cooked food (vegetables, salad) should be well washed.



SECURITY BRIEF



Personal security is primarily the responsibility of the staff member and appointed officials. The Security and Safety Services Division is always available to provide assistance and guidance on issues of security and safety and operates a Warden System to assist expatriate staff members' and appointed officials' interaction with the local police.

PLACES WHERE YOU NEED TO BE VIGILANT

Violent crime in Addis Ababa is fortunately rare, particularly where visitors are concerned. However, petty theft and confidence tricks are problematic.

The Merkato has the worst reputation as pickpockets abound – targeting not just "faranjis" (white foreigners) but Ethiopians as well. You are advised to leave hand luggage and jewellery in your hotel/house if you plan on visiting the Merkato.

Other spots where you should be vigilant include:

Piazza, where many foreigners get pickpocketed or mugged;

- Meskel Square;
- · minibus stands:
- at the vicinity of larger hotels;

and Churchill Avenue, where adult gangs have been known to hang around the National Theatre.

Common gang ploys are to feign a fight or argument and, when one man appeals to you for help, the other helps himself to your pockets.

Don't let any of this scare you, though – Addis is very safe compared to many other African capitals.

ACCOMODATION

- In order to be able to help you quickly if you need to, choose accommodation that is not too far from the African Union (see Area to live).
- For security reason, staff members and appointed officials are encouraged to change all door keys of all access gates with non-duplicable keys.
- Use common sense, overcome routines, prepare for the unexpected and always be alert.

BANK AND CURRENCY

Ethiopia's national currency is the Birr (ETB) which comes in bank notes of 5, 10, 50 and 100. Coins are in 1, 5, 10, 25 and 50 cent denominations as well as 1 Birr denomination. One United States Dollar is approximately equivalent to 22 Birr. Major Banks have a cash dispenser (ATM), accepting Visa and Master Card. Foreign currencies can be exchanged at the banks which are open from 8:30 (the latest) to 5:30 (the earliest) from Monday to Saturday.

CALENDAR AND TIME

Ethiopia uses a Julian calendar, which divides the year into 12 months of 30 days each. The remaining five days (or six days in a leap year) constitute the 13th month known as "Pagume". The Ethiopian Calendar is seven years behind the Gregorian calendar, with the Ethiopian New Year falling on the 11th of September. Based on the Ethiopian calendar, 2018 equivalent is year 2010.

Ethiopian Time is determined by the times of sunrise and sunset. 06.00 International time - sunrise - is 12 night Ethiopian time. One hour later it is 1 o'clock in the day [Ethiopian time] and the sequence continues through to sunset.

The Ethiopian climate is temperate in the highlands and hot in the low-lands. Temperature ranges from 20°C to 30°C. Rainfall ranges from 200 mm to 2000 mm. Ethiopia receives heavy rains in June, July and August; and small rains in February and March.

Electricity in Ethiopia is 220 Volts, alternating at 50 cycles per second. If you travel to Ethiopia with a device that does not accept 220 Volts at 50 Hertz, you will need a voltage converter. Ethiopian Electric Utility (EEU) is responsible for distribution of electricity to customers throughout the country. Electricity consumption can be pre-paid as well as post-paid.

Addis Ababa Water and Sewerage Authority is responsible for distribution of water to costumers throughout the country. For a monthly consumption of 8-20 m3 of water, you'll pay around 1.3 centimes per m3.




